BENEFITTING FROM THE EXAMPLE OF OUR SENIORS...

While St. Leo is becoming a younger parish with over 60 baptisms and only one funeral last year, it continues to be grounded in the faith and wisdom of its elders, both past and present.

Though some long-time parishioners may recognize those mentioned names will not be used in order to allow readers to begin to develop their own list of senior "saints" that have impacted their faith journeys both here and in their own families and communities.


Service to the church is often a hallmark of those in their later years and it is usually behind the scenes, humble work like taking care of washing and ironing of cloths needed for Mass and seeing that candles are ready. Others work in ministries of hospitality and being Eucharistic distributors. Still others are involved in music and prison ministry and take communion to the sick. Being at Mass each week is important to them and they come to church in their finest

clothes often carrying well-worn prayer books. A woman who was a friend and mentor to many died as she got ready to come to a people. Another long time parishioner who had been very active in taking leadership and following in their footsteps. the parish and is now home bound still is involved from a distance and frequently calls with input and ideas. PTA work when there was

a school, craft sales and commitment to being there when things needed to be done marked the life of one who had lived in the neighborhood all of her life.

Refugees from violence and war come with experiences of seeing loved ones killed and loss of everything but their faith that carried them through horrors difficult to imagine. They come with hopes for their future and a desire to see their children and grandchildren have better lives but still stay grounded in the values and relationship with God that continues to sustain them.

Helping others and sharing what they have motivated many of our seniors. One who raised ten children of her own took in children in need and relatives going through hard times—no questions asked. Another who was known for her baked goods and Italian food,



invited a family with less to share Thanksgiving with her family even though she didn't have much herself.

Those who have been in the neighborhood many years share the stories and history of the past when the area was thriving, are getting involved in neighborhood planning, and share visions of what is possible in the future.

There have been parishioners who started and staffed a food co-op in the building that is now Angels' Arms. A man who was known as the St. Joseph of St. Leo's for his ability to repair and build things, as well as his gentle spirit, helped start the food pantry which was managed for many years by a woman who wouldn't go with the EMT's until the food was loaded in the van even after she broke her hip slipping on a wet floor. Another long-time parishioner whose family literally helped build the church made sure to turn in her envelope to Father who visited her as she lay dying. She supported her parish until the end.

Our seniors have been a dedicated group and their labors revival at St. Leo's. Her life was quiet but she touched so many and example are bearing fruit as young families and youth are

our and together corporal works of mercy, we hear and see the works of the


Christ who is ever so present among us. Although we do these things to prepare for the Lord's second coming, we also do these

Imana shimwe! Alabare al Senor! Ev'ryone praise the Lord! Gott sei dank! Grazie a Dio!


















FINDING GOD IN THE MIDST OF THE MESS...

so many things seem to be spinning out of control. Maybe it's God. Peter went back to fishing. because so many people seem fearful and our society\ seems more and more divided. Maybe the gloom and cold and gray days of winter are making things worse. In any case it seems that left to our own devises we are making a mess of our relationships, our society, and our planet. I, for one, don't' like living in a state of powerlessness and anxiety, but good news is often hard to come



by and I sometimes find myself crying out "where are You, God?'

Maybe it's about the way one looks at things-something like the story difference between the optimist and the pessimist. pessimist is given a pony for his birthday and begins to moan about all the work he'd have to do to take care of it. The optimist walks into

the smelly, filthy barn and rejoices. "With all this manure, there's got to be a pony here somewhere." Like I said, it could be the lens I'm looking through that colors how I see things. Would it be different if I believed that in the midst of all this apparent chaos, there's grace and God is at work?

Spending time with the Scriptures and in prayer reminds me that what is happening is nothing new. People have been in this place many times before throughout history and though it may not take the current ache away, it gives me confidence that God never leaves and is always beside us.

Like the father of the prodigal son, God allows us to make our own choices which are often selfish and inconsiderate—and then deal with the consequences. When we begin to regret what we have done—and sometimes even before because he loves us

so much--God rushes to us, embraces us, doesn't rub our noses in it and say "I told you so" and often even uses our missteps and failures to bring about healing—not just for ourselves but often for others as well.

The Big Book of AA says something very similar:: "I used to think that being an alcoholic was the worst thing that could happen to me. Now I realize it's my greatest gift." The journey to recovery has often enabled people to develop a deeper relationship with God and with others and what seemed to be disaster has become gift to be shared.

Each of us has a part to play in changing things for the better and we all come up with our own excuses not to act and trust in God's promise. We find that heroes from the Bible were much like us. When told she would have a baby at her advanced age, Abraham's wife Sarai laughed.. Moses put conditions on his response to God's call. "I need to know your name before I can lead the Israelites out of Egypt." Jeremiah argued that he was too young (though scholars tell us he was middle-aged at the time). Jonah

In spite of our waffling, God still invites us and calls us to act. Listen to the prophet Haggai talking to the people of Israel about God's desire to change things and their role in accomplishing this:

Who is left among you who saw this house in its former glory? And how do you see it now?

...Now be strong, .all you people of the land and WORK! For I am with you—

This is the commitment I made to you when you came out of Egypt. My spirit remains in your midst; do not fear! For thus says the LORD of hosts: *In just a little while,*

I will shake the heavens and the earth,

the sea and the dry land.

I will shake all the nations, so that the treasures of all the nations will come in.

And I will fill this house with glory says the LORD of hosts.

Greater will be the glory of this house than the former—says the LORD of hosts;


And in this place I will give you peace—
