


Many, many thanks to the donor who answered our Wish List and provided a wall-mounted Defibrillator for the Food Pantry. Truly a life-saving gift!

Pastor's Ponderings . . .

This is the month that Easter begins and we continue to celebrate it in our liturgies for fifty days. All of us at St. Leo the Great Parish wish you Feliz Pascua, Pasti Conziza, Happy Easter! We hope and pray that you will thoroughly enjoy and delight in the fifty days of celebrating Easter that conclude with the grand celebration of Pentecost. We pray that you will be blessed with new and abundant life of God's presence in your life, rejoicing as you live your faith, renewed by the promises of your baptism, singing Alleluia and practicing resurrection. Thank you for the hope you will live and bring to others by living more freely away from sin and death in our world. Celebrate the Lord's victory over death by loving unconditionally and helping raise others up over the weaknesses of the human condition. Show your family and the whole world that life, eternal life has the final say now and forever. Easter 2017

ROME- In vintage Pope Francis style, the pontiff broke with tradition and delivered an off-the-cuff homily for Easter Sunday, one of the very few improvised speeches in such a solemn setting from a pope who's used to putting his prepared remarks aside to speak from the heart on more informal occasions.

"Jesus has risen from the dead," Francis said. "And this is not a fantasy. It's not a celebration with many flowers [pointing at the arrangements surrounding him]. This is beautiful, but [the resurrection] is more."

"It is the mystery of the throwaway stone, that ends up being the cornerstone of our existence. Christ has risen from the dead. In this throwaway culture, where that which is not useful takes the path of the use-and-throw, where that which is not useful is discarded, that stone that was discarded is the fountain of life," he said.

And even "us, little pebbles," who've been thrown in an earth full of "suffering, tragedy," with faith in the risen Christ, "have a reason for being, amidst so much calamity. A sense to look beyond: There is not a wall, but a horizon. There's life, joy, in there is the cross with this ambivalence."

The pope began his remarks saying that the Church, facing "our distrust, [and] closed and fearful hearts," continues to say, "calm down, the Lord has risen." But, he continued, if he has come back from the dead, "how

do these things happen, so many tragedies: illnesses, human trafficking, human exploitation, wars, destruction, mutilations, vengeance, hatred?" "Where is the Lord?" he asked aloud.

Francis then shared that on Saturday he'd phoned a young man, an engineer with a "serious illness," and the pope told him "there are no explanations for what's happening to you. Look at Jesus crucified, God has done this with his son. There's no other explanation." To this, the pontiff said, the man answered: "Yes, but he [God] asked his Son and the Son said yes. He didn't ask me if I wanted this. "And this moves us. Not one of us is asked, 'Are you happy with what's happening in the World? Are you willing to carry this cross?'" he said. "Today the Church continues to say, stop, Jesus is risen."

"You, little pebble, have a reason in life. Because you're a pebble holding on to the cornerstone, that stone that evilness of sin has discarded," Francis said in his homily. "What does the Church say amidst so much tragedy: the stone that was discarded wasn't ... From within the heart [the Church says] Jesus is risen!"

Closing his homily, Francis called upon those present to think about the every-day problems of life, illnesses, wars, human tragedies and say, "with a humble voice, without flowers, alone, to God who's in front of us: 'I don't know how this is going, but I'm sure that Christ has risen.'"

He's Alive!!

There's a painting in the back of St. Leo's church of Jesus breaking bread with the disciples he revealed himself to as they walked together on the road to Emmaus. The artist, the late Father Jim Hasse, SJ used parishioners as models, a reminder that Jesus is always present, among, in, and with us as we journey through life.

Enter that scene if you will, and imagine what it would have been like if you were one of those disciples. You are sad and depressed and sharing your grief and dashed hopes with your friends. How could this have happened? Jesus was a prophet, a healer, a good friend. He came into our homes. We shared meals. He laughed and wept with us. He changed our lives. Things were going to get better. We thought he was the Messiah and would save Israel. Now all of that has changed.

As we are talking a stranger walks up joins us and asks us about our conversation. Where has he been?? How can he not know what had happened? Everyone is talking about it.

"Are you the only one in Israel who doesn't know what's been going on," we ask and then begin to pour out our sense of loss and hopelessness. Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people was handed over to a sentence of death and crucified by our chief priests and rulers. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see."

"It's over. Jesus is dead. Even the body is gone. There's nothing to hope for. Can you see now why we are upset?" And in the face of our grief, the stranger gently confronts us and says, "You really don't get it. Look at the Scriptures. From as early as Moses the

prophets told us that the Messiah had to die. Jesus' death isn't a surprise. And it's not the end."

Who is this guy we wonder and how can he possibly say it's not the end. Doesn't he understand how broken-hearted we are? Maybe if we spend more time with him he'll get it, but he says he

was going to another place. "Come on," we say, "just a little bit longer. Have dinner with us. It's getting late and darkness is descending." Reluctantly, it seems to us, he agrees. The meal's before us now and as we eat something is starting to feel very familiar. We look up and notice he is taking bread and blessing it. Didn't Jesus do that the last time we were together at Passover? It can't be or maybe, just maybe it is Jesus. That would be too good to be true. He looks at us. His eyes are filled with love. It's him! It really is Jesus!! Joy is swelling in our hearts. It really isn't over. Jesus is alive. "Stay with us," we plead but he disappears from our sight into the darkness. Still we know he is still with us and always will be.

This news is too good to just keep to ourselves—we have seen Jesus. We recognized him in the breaking of the bread. We run back and tell the others.

Imagining got us into a sense of what it was like for those early disciples then, but Jesus is also walking with us and revealing himself to us through the Eucharist where God reminds us that God's love for us is so intense that God wants to feed us and become part of our very bodies through the bread and wine. That's a mind-blowing reality. God also is present with us and nourishes us in and through the body of our faith community as we gather to pray and work together. God is with and in us every moment of every day continuing to feed and surprise us in unexpected people and events.

He's alive and so are we alive in him—Alleluia!!


