Continuing the Ministry of Mercy . . .



He said,

"The Church without frontiers, mother to all, spreads throughout the world a culture of acceptance and solidarity in which none is seen as useless, out of place, or disposable." This is the charge the Pope gives to us. Thus we commit ourselves to:

- bear wrongs patiently
