My Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

Last week we commemorated the *Solemnity of All Saints* and the *Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed* (All Souls' Day), two important feasts in our liturgical calendar where we are privileged to look back on lives who inspire us and who have returned to the loving arms of our Lord. As Catholics, we have read about the Saints of the Church who accomplished extraordinary things in their lifetimes, often with us maintaining a close devotion to more than a few of them and their remarkable legacies. St. Josemaria Escriva said it best: "Let us turn to the example of the saints. They were people like us, flesh and bone, with failings and weaknesses, who managed to conquer and master themselves for the love of God. Let us consider their lives and, like bees who distill precious nectar from each flower, we shall learn from their struggles."

Moreover, perhaps with equal importance, we honor our faithful departed on November 2, often with a litany of parishioners at Church who have departed this life during the year. All of us, not only on this special day, remain devoted to a person or persons we have known and loved with all our hearts who have departed to be with our Lord. No matter how much time has passed, we continue to treasure, honor, and sorely miss these wonderful individuals who will forever enhance and inspire our lives.

Sometimes, when we think of them, it makes us so sad; but, in those moments, pray and thank God they were part of the fabric of your life. So, on these two special days in November, we are fortunate to be able to reflect on our miraculous saints and those miraculous friends and family that continue to work their magic in our lives.

Today is the Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time and through the Gospel of Luke, we consider the resurrection of our own souls, as described by Jesus, in answering a question put forth to Him by the Sadducees, an ancient Jewish sect who did not believe in life after death. The Sadducees posed this question to try to trick and humiliate Jesus, but with kindness and humility, Jesus brilliantly describes us as the children of a "living God," and those who rise to Him after death, are alive with Him forever. It is fitting at this time of year, in conjunction with these two feasts, we consider not only death, but life—our life with Christ our Lord. It's easy to forget in our fast-paced society with so much "stuff" swirling around in our heads, and in our lives, that this life is only a temporary one. Of course, we are not equipped as humans to imagine how our Lord will move us through the door in death to a new life. Yet, we know through Scripture, the traditions of the Church, and our abiding faith, that through God's love, mercy, and compassion, we can transcend to His loving arms for all of eternity.
